

PHRASAL VERBS (D)

dash off

• to leave hurriedly

After he received a call, he dashed off to the hospital.

deal out

to distribute cards or other papers

The teacher dealt out the papers to each student then gave them a detailed explanation.

deal with

address or tackle a task

I am really busy recently and need to deal with lots of paperwork every day.

die away

to grow fainter

The wind died away and became a gentle breeze.

die off

to gradually die

The drought caused the crops to die off.

die out

to become extinct

Dinosaur died out many years ago and other species are also in danger.

dine out

• to have dinner away from home

We will dine out this evening to celebrate our wedding anniversary.

dispose of

to throw away or sell

I am planning to dispose of my old car and buy a new one.

do away with

• to remove, to stop using

Nowadays people have been doing away with writing letters and send email instead.

do without

• to cease resorting to

We can not do that project without the company's full support.

drag on

to continue tediously

The speech by the new chairman dragged on for about two hours and bored everyone.

draw aside

to move to one side

I sensed he wanted to draw me aside to tell me more facts.

draw back

to withdraw

The troops had to withdraw and return from the battle font.

draw near

to approach

The vocation is drawing near many people begin planning for the trip.

dream up

• to imagine, conceive (a plan, etc.)

I wonder what ridiculous scheme he will dream up next.

dress up

to dress elegantly or for a special occasion

People will dress up when they attend a wedding.

drink up

to drink all

He drank up the whole bottle of whisky and got very drunk.

drive away

to depart in a motor vehicle

My friend dropped me at school then drove away.

drive out

to expel

The beggar was driven out of the restaurant by the owner.

drop out of

• to leave or withdraw from (typically a study course)

He decided to drop out of that major because it was too difficult.
