

PHRASAL VERBS (I)

idle away

to waste (time), to spend (time) on idle pursuits
Don't idle away or waste your time on games - focus on your studies instead.

invite in

to invite somebody to come into (one's home, a room)
When I saw my friend passing by my home, I invited him in.

iron out

remove small or minor problems
We still have to iron out the small details to finalize the deal.

Invite out

to ask somebody to go out
My classmate invited me out for dinner and a movie this weekend.

jabber away

talk a lot
He just jabbers away instead of getting to the point.

jack up

raise the price
The florists will jack up their prices significantly before Valentine's Day.

jam up against

to force together
Just jam up those boards against the back wall.

jazz up

to make more interesting
You need to jazz up your report with some graphics to make ti more interesting.

jerk around

waste someone's time
I hate it when they just me around and nothing positive gets accomplished.

join in

• to take part in

The kid soon became comfortable with his new classmates and joined in the fun with them.

join up

• to connect (wires)

He joined up or connected the wrong wires, which blew out all the bulbs.

jot down

to briefly write down
He jotted down a series of numbers and passed them to me.

juice up

make more exciting
The news of their relationship will juice up the office gossip to a new level.

jump at

to seize (an opportunity)
All students should jump at the opportunity to get a scholarship to study abroad.

jump up

to suddenly or quickly stand up
While the judges compile their scores, the audience will jump up to cheer the success of their own team members.
